



n kindergarten, the curriculum followed at school is a blend of practices based on the Waldorf Education and Montessori learning system. The programme promotes the development of multi-skilled, confident and articulate children who love to learn. The curriculum focuses on the development of logical thinking, phonic awareness, life, motor and cognitive skills . Teaching is done through activities which not only capture their imagination, but also boost independent thinking, problem solving, confidence and self esteem. The Montessori system is a child-centered educational approach based on the scientific observation of children from birth to adulthood while Waldorf system which lays emphasis on practical, hands-on activities and creative play.

A one of a kind 'Montessori and Waldorf Lab' set up at Dikshant Global School campus for pre primary classes is well equipped with the tools to help children to develop these skills. The aim of having this unique infrastructure is to provide students with a developmentally appropriate environment which nurtures and enables them to procure their true potential. This also encourages children to learn by doing and to incorporate a sense of learning and accomplishment into their everyday tasks and activities.

















Kiran Nagarkar Library

Inauguration Date: 1st March 2018

The Kiran Nagarkar Library was inaugurated at Dikshant Global School campus on 1st March 2018. The library is named after author Kiran Nagarkar —one of the most significant writers of the post-colonial India and the winner of the Sahitya Akademi Award for his acclaimed novel Cuckold in

the year,2001. Mr.

Kiran Nagarkar was the Chief Guest at the inaugural event & he along-with Mr. Mitul Dikshit lit the lamp to unveil the Library formally.

The library which is set up in an area of around 7000 square feet is both a physical and a virtual space. It has a well updated collection of 10000 books, 5000 CDs and DVDs. Keeping pace with the new technology and digitalized way of instruction, the new library provides users with remote access to over 5000 e-books and 50 e-journals. Quiet reading and study areas are there for those who need it, but the library will also be used as a cultural and social space where people can come together to watch theatre and film screenings, or take part in workshops, seminars, meetings and author talks.

The children's section is aimed at bringing children closer to books because we believe that it is the most effective way to elevate their critical thinking abilities and imagination.


The library is aesthetically designed with the printed window blinds possessing images of some of the most prominent Nobel Laureates in Literature. The concept of the Athenaeum (an environment that promotes learning in its largest sense and it is not limited to just printed and digital media) is being promoted through the library. The Athenaeum concept also supports a much wider understanding of a space used for all purposes that unite knowledge and the community with both intellectual and social dimensions, a place for cultural and community exchanges as much as scholarly discourse.







Genre:

Adventure Stories

Through the course of the two-day workshop, the children were given guidance on how to develop and write an adventure story. With slides, interactive discussions and a series of fun exercises, participants were taught the different elements of a story. The importance of strong characters was enumerated and tips were given to build a good plot. Each participant was encouraged to develop their individual stories. The workshop ended with an



elucidating the editing process and its role in shaping a good story.

Genre:

Teenage Stories

On the first day, some warm up exercises were done to



get the creativity of students flowing – such as free writing and a story telling chain. Students were also given tips on how to inculcate and exhibit emotions in writing.

The second day was slightly more technical and students worked on the differences between story, theme and plot as well as how to describe a situation in a way that the reader can truly feel like he is present

The day was riddled with games and activities to keep things fun and practical.

Genre:

Hindi Poetry

The children did some warm up exercises of plain rhyming, writing about the ordinary mundane things of life, special people to unusual experiences and hilarities of life. Humour poetry in Hindi by various poets was read out to them to get them into the groove and make them think crazy and funny stuff.

Students picked what they deemed as their best and



fine tuned it with metaphors, infusing it with more imagery and even dosing it with more naughtiness

Genre:

Horror Stories

In the month of August, students studied horror as a genre. While

listening to stories, they paid special attention to incidents and characters that unsettled. This helped in examining the building of a narrative rich in drama, suspense and fear. Using "The Omen" as a case study, they explored the use of flat and round characters, mise-en-scène (colour schemes, lighting, weather, etc.), camera angles and music in creating an ambience of terror. Very short horror fiction helped in the study of brevity (a useful skill for any writer!). They also edited longer forms, removing one word or phrase at a time, until they had arrived at the perfect expression, often told the whole story in just a sentence or two.

Genre:

Historical Fiction

The workshop focused on making the participants understand the aspects involved in the writing of a good historical fiction—on the importance of accuracy and readability as paramount criteria, for instance. At the same time, it underlined the need for highlighting the presence of women in the historical past.

On the first day of the workshop,

On the first day of the workshop, these two key aspects were discussed and the two works of gender-based historical fiction, Harsha Vardhana and Queen of Ice were also surveyed through a



presentation and an interaction. The students came up with ideas for stories that they would write. On the second day, the students wrote their individual pieces focusing on women in history and then read them out to the group.

Genre:

Nature Writing

In the two-day workshop students worked from awareness of breathing to mapping memory and place. Then



they translated different ideas and experiences about nature through different modes of writing. They explored poetry, essay and short story writing. They also played with humour, futuristic thinking, sense of joy and sadness to find diverse ways to think about nature. They also explored how to use each of our senses to sensitise ourselves to nature and then include in our writing. The workshop focused on the fact that Nature and Self are entwined in our capacity to feel, use our senses and express our experiences as part of the natural world. The workshop attempted to emerge a creative space and process in these exciting, unknown and often forgotten spaces for children.

Genre:

Illustration Workshop

Reading the work of another author and poet is a delightful journey to discover our own connections. This workshop introduced students to reading and finding interesting moments in the stories and poems of other students to capture them in illustration.

Children were acquainted with



different styles of art, illustration, compositions and layouts. It inspired them to come up with ideas for their own illustration.

Genre:

Stories on friendship using animals as characters



The two-day workshop on Story Writing started off with an exposition on how stories come about and the importance of imagination. It also laid emphasis on how the time-honoured question 'what if?' triggers off stories and the influence of character and plot in a story. Some writing tips like the advantages of using short sentences, usage of dialogue and the importance of 'showing' and not 'telling.'

At Dikshant, we believe that books are a treasure trove of knowledge that lead to curiosity, creativity, imagination, exploration, and finally enthusiastic learners. Continuing with our endeavor to inculcate the values and joy of reading in children from the early years, primary wing of school celebrated Literula Week from 14th to 19th May 2018 . The six day event comprised a host interesting activities for the children including story telling sessions by teachers, parents and grandparents. They also indulged in discussions on respecting, sharing and taking care of books. Students also visited the library specifically to understand the importance of library, rules to be followed and making book marks. They watched movies and narrated stories in assembly using finger puppetry. The week ended with Character Parade Competition where they enacted different characters from the stories read by them.

Telescope Making Workshop



A 7 day telescope making workshop was organised at the space centre from 2nd to 8th May. During the workshop students will learn how to build a telescope from the scratch under the guidance of a telescope expert from IUCAA, Pune, Mr. Tushar Purohit. Mr. Purohit is having 19 years of experience in Telescope making and astronomy.

In all 25 students from Grades VII-X, were involved in the telescope making. Five different teams having 5 students each were made and a total of 5 telescopes were created. The motive of this workshop was to acquaint students with the process of making practical use of their classroom lessons.

The initial phase of the workshop started with teaching students how to grind concave mirror, calculate curvature and focal length of mirrors. This was followed by a session on smoothening of glass which holds great importance in the telescope making process. Till third day of the workshop, students were able to properly grind the glass. The fourth and fifth day mainly focused on teaching them the process of polishing of glass using pitch tool. For the last two days, students were involved in doing testing of glass, calculating length of tube and drilling the same for fitting. In addition, they also started coloring the tube. The students made Newtonian type telescopes. They used household items to create the telescopes. Table top glass was grinded by keeping one over other with carborandom (silicon carbide). The main body of telescope was made using PVC pipes which were painted from the inside and outside by students, these were then put up on an Altitude Azimuth mount. A concave mirror was used instead of a lens to make the telescopes. All the sessions made students understand aspects like how a telescope functions, it's parts & their uses etc. the real learning came when the students made telescopes in a hands-on manner. As a culmination of a seven day workshop, an 'Exhibition of Telescopes' was organized by the students.





Voyage through **Space**



Students and parents had a glimpse into space on 26th March through a 'Voyage into Space'.

Special shows were organized in school planetarium for students and parents. Children were dressed up in space suits and enjoyed space party, unscrambled the universe, engineered space objects, created their own cosmic world and thus unraveled various mysteries of space. The event was informative as well as entertaining for the kids.

Robotics team designs Radar

Today's artificial intelligence is all about new ways of connecting people to computers, physical world and people. There is a continuous need of development and communication.



Understanding the need of the hour, our Robotics Team has designed a "RADAR" using Arduino Uno. The young minds of Robotics activity developed their own technique and ways to design the Radar, which specializes in detecting the sounds travelling around.

Planetarium show on Blue Moon (Total Lunar Eclipse)

Viewing a Rare Celestial Phenomenon live in school Planetarium -Blue moon, total Lunar Eclipse and Super Moon.

A rare Total Lunar Eclipse took place on January 31 for

the first time in over 150 years. As a part of the Space program at Dikshant, parents and students were invited in school to be a part of this event in the school planetarium. Being second full moon of the month, also known as Blue Moon was a rare phenomenon and was the first eclipse in this New Year. Watching this event was a life time experience for students.

Fostering Thinking Skills

First Think Lab in the region



Region's first Think Lab, was inaugurated at Dikshant Global School by Dera Bassi MLA, Mr. N K Sharma on 23rd December 2017. Think Lab is a workspace where young minds can give shape to their ideas through hands-on, do-it-yourself mode and learn innovation skills. Young children will get a chance to work with tools and equipment to understand the concepts of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math).

The main objective of think lab is to foster curiosity, creativity, and imagination in young minds; and inculcate skills such as design mindset, computational thinking, adaptive learning, physical computing etc

The lab has been envisaged to be the hub for innovation, invention, making, tinkering and giving shape to ideas solving local and global problems using technology. This lab will play the role of incubators of ideas and inspire the young students to step out of their comfort zone and work on novel concepts, embrace future skills as well as develop confidence and personality skills.

This lab will unleash student's entrepreneurial spirit and ignite their inner innovator-build and test their own creations in hands-on prototyping space.

ThinkLab contains educational kits and age appropriate equipment on – electronics, soldering, sensors, arduino, raspberry pi, 3D printers, internet of things, drones, robotics, wood and carpentry work, lathe machine work, drilling work, hand and power tools for projects etc., to create technology innovations for applications in multiple sectors. Students will also get an opportunity to work on real-time projects including artificial intelligence and machine learning.

Smart Blind Sticks

In this project students have developed Blind Sticks for visually impaired/blind people. They have used different sensors so that whenever any obstacle or person comes in front of a blind person, the stick automatically vibrates and starts buzzing to help the person. Students are f urther doing research and are trying to add GPS and GSM technology so that family members of the blind person can detect his live location.

Smart Dustbin

Students have made smart dustbin which opens automatically once the person comes in front of it. It closes after some time. In further extension of this project students have started research and development i.e. how they can use Internet of Things (IOT's) and get info about wet and dry garbage, level of garbage in dustbins etc.



3D Printer

Students have learnt about designing using software, 3D Printer technology, filament used in 3D Printer and how to operate it. They have designed and

printed different projects using 3D printer like Rocket model, Dice, Taj Mahal etc. The most exciting project they made was the *Dancing Robot* using 3D printer and interfacing it using different sensors.

Wood Work Project



Students made their first wood work project. They designed the beautiful bamboo lamps. They were very excited to use hand and mechanical tools like hammer, axe-saw for cutting wood/bamboo cylinders, and chisel for the first time. In addition, they used drill machine

for drilling and made electric LED panels for fitting inside the bamboo lamp. After cutting, sanding, drilling and fixing the entire arrangement they varnished the lamps. In the end, they tested the bamboo lamp for the functionality.

Soldering

In this workshop, students have understood the basic concept of electronics. Now they can easily

do soldering and de-soldering using soldering iron. They can also make any circuit on breadboard as well as on PCB's.

Environmental Monitoring System

Environmental monitoring system uses temperature, humidity, light, pressure and gas sensors. In this project Bluetooth sensors are used as a communication module in order to get live environmental data using the Mobile app.

Drone Technology








